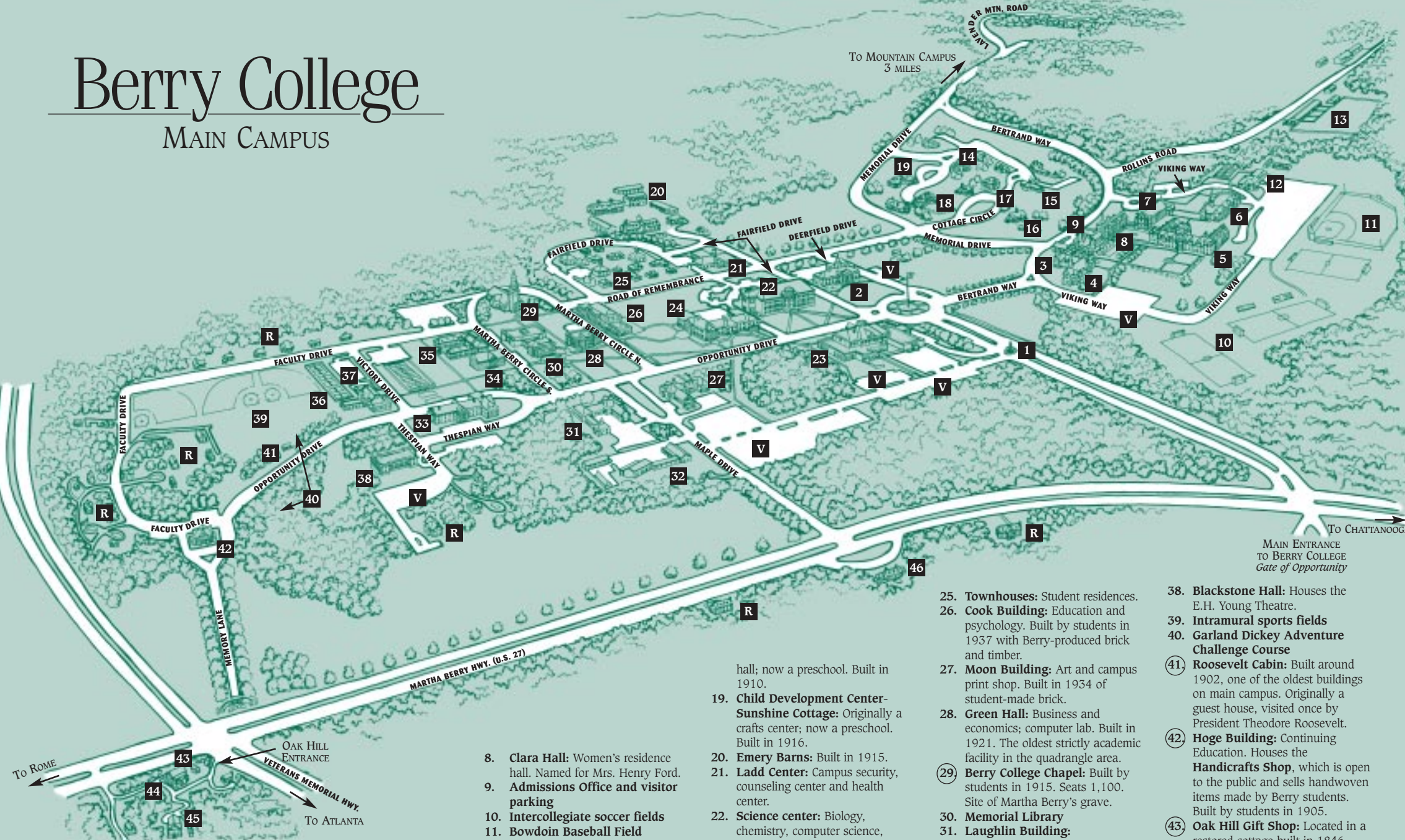


# Berry College

## MAIN CAMPUS



- indicates popular landmarks
- 1. **Main entrance gatehouse:** Staffed 24 hours a day to provide visitor information and assistance.
- 2. **Hermann Hall:** Administration building. Completed in 1964.
- ③-9 **Ford Complex:** English Gothic architecture. Given to Berry by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford of Dearborn, Mich. Constructed in phases beginning in 1925.

- 3. **Ford classrooms:** Music.
- 4. **Ford Auditorium:** Distinguished by the tower bearing a large clock. Seats 500.
- 5. **Mary Hall:** Women's residence hall. Residence life office. Named for Henry Ford's mother.
- 6. **Ford Gymnasium**
- 7. **Ford Hall:** Used for social events, band hall. Modeled after the dining hall at Christ College of Oxford, England.

- 8. **Clara Hall:** Women's residence hall. Named for Mrs. Henry Ford.
- 9. **Admissions Office and visitor parking**
- 10. **Intercollegiate soccer fields**
- 11. **Bowdoin Baseball Field**
- 12. **Lamar Westcott Building:** Agriculture department and a computer lab.
- 13. **Rollins Center:** Ruminant research center.
- 14. **Catherine Cottage:** Guest cottage office.
- 15. **Guest cottages**
- ⑬ **Barnwell Chapel:** Built in 1911.
- 17. **Dorothy Cottage:** Women's residence.
- 18. **Child Development Center-Atlanta Hall:** Originally a dining

- hall; now a preschool. Built in 1910.
- 19. **Child Development Center-Sunshine Cottage:** Originally a crafts center; now a preschool. Built in 1916.
- 20. **Emery Barns:** Built in 1915.
- 21. **Ladd Center:** Campus security, counseling center and health center.
- 22. **Science center:** Biology, chemistry, computer science, environmental science, mathematics and physics.
- 23. **Krannert Center:** Cafeteria; bookstore; post office; Freshman Center; food services; offices of career development, student activities, student government, volunteer services and college chaplain.
- 24. **Evans Hall:** English, foreign languages, religion, social sciences and philosophy; computer lab; media center.

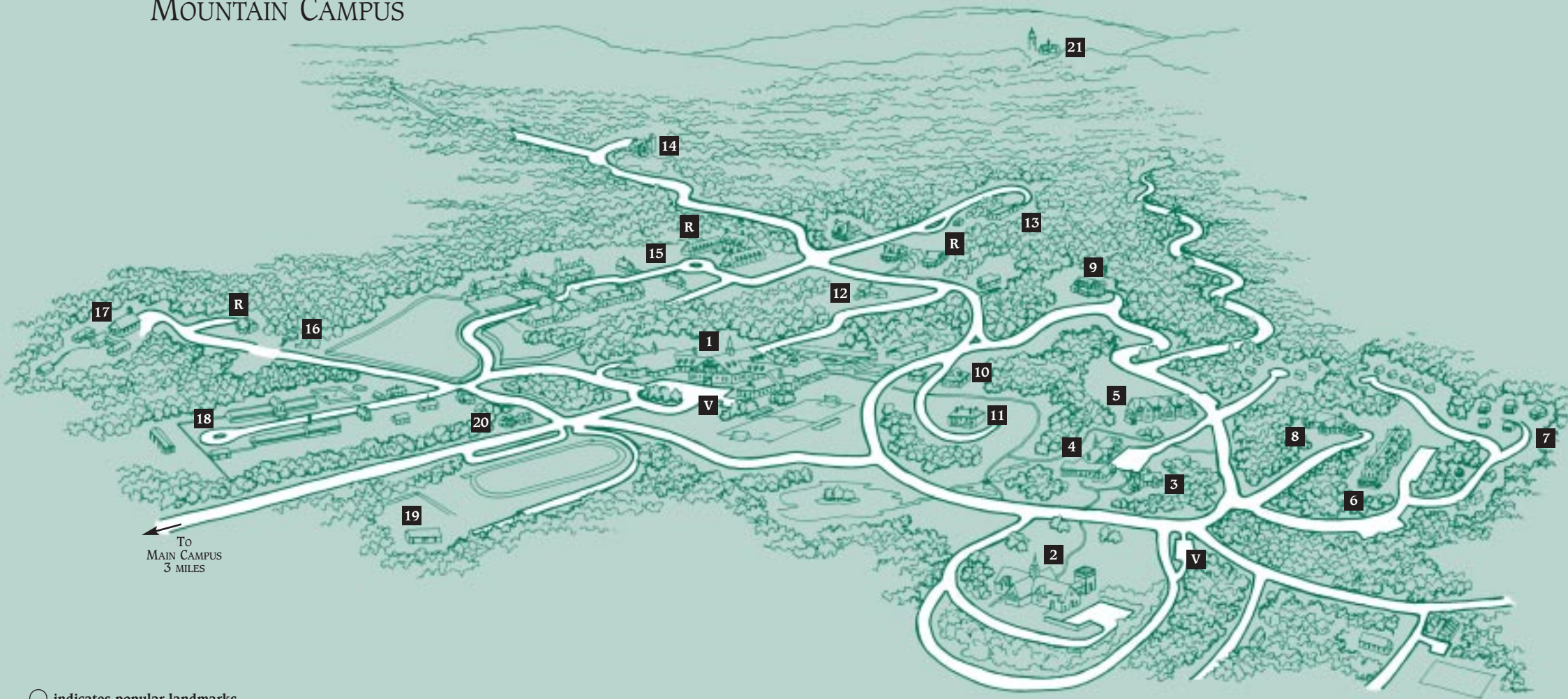
- 25. **Townhouses:** Student residences.
- 26. **Cook Building:** Education and psychology. Built by students in 1937 with Berry-produced brick and timber.
- 27. **Moon Building:** Art and campus print shop. Built in 1934 of student-made brick.
- 28. **Green Hall:** Business and economics; computer lab. Built in 1921. The oldest strictly academic facility in the quadrangle area.
- ⑲ **Berry College Chapel:** Built by students in 1915. Seats 1,100. Site of Martha Berry's grave.
- 30. **Memorial Library**
- 31. **Laughlin Building:** Communication.
- 32. **Jones Building:** Campus maintenance.
- 33. **Morton-Lemley Hall:** Women's residence hall.
- 34. **Thomas Berry Hall:** Men's residence hall. Named for Miss Berry's father.
- 35. **Dana Hall:** Men's residence hall.
- 36. **Intercollegiate tennis courts**
- 37. **Roy Richards Memorial Gymnasium:** Pool and fitness center.

- 38. **Blackstone Hall:** Houses the E.H. Young Theatre.
- 39. **Intramural sports fields**
- 40. **Garland Dickey Adventure Challenge Course**
- ④① **Roosevelt Cabin:** Built around 1902, one of the oldest buildings on main campus. Originally a guest house, visited once by President Theodore Roosevelt.
- ④② **Hoge Building:** Continuing Education. Houses the **Handicrafts Shop**, which is open to the public and sells handwoven items made by Berry students. Built by students in 1905.
- ④③ **Oak Hill Gift Shop:** Located in a restored cottage built in 1846. Snack area, picnic area.
- ④④ **The Martha Berry Museum:** Houses an impressive art collection and memorabilia associated with Miss Berry and the schools.
- ④⑤ **Oak Hill:** Historic home of Berry founder Martha Berry.

| <p>1. <b>WinShape Centre:</b> Established in 1984 by Chick-fil-A founder Truett Cathy to provide college scholarships and special opportunities for personal growth for young people. Also utilized in summer for Camp WinShape. Previously a high school campus.</p> <p>2. <b>Frost Memorial Chapel:</b> Constructed by students and staff in 1936-37. Features wooden beamed ceiling, flagstone floor, leaded glass windows, slate roof and three beautiful stained glass windows.</p> | <p>3. <b>Barstow Memorial Library:</b> Presently used by the Berry College Elementary School.</p> <p>4. <b>Berry College Elementary School (Hamrick Hall):</b> A private school for grades K-8.</p> <p>5. <b>Friendship Hall:</b> Women's residence hall.</p> <p>6. <b>Pilgrim Hall:</b> Men's residence hall.</p> <p>7. <b>Log cabins:</b> Constructed in recent years for summer campers attending Camp WinShape.</p> <p>8. <b>Hill Dining Hall:</b> Built in 1923, originally served as a bakery. Now used for special occasions, summer camp, WinShape students.</p> | <p>9. <b>Meacham Hall:</b> Guest housing for WinShape Centre. Built in 1921.</p> <p>10. <b>Cherokee Lodge:</b> Home for WinShape Centre Director. Built in 1920.</p> <p>11. <b>Pine Lodge:</b> Guest housing for WinShape Centre. Built in 1916, oldest building on Mountain Campus. The original Foundation School for Boys.</p> <p>12. <b>Kimbell Cottage:</b> WinShape Centre facility.</p> <p>13. <b>Water filtration plant</b></p> <p>14. <b>Old Mill Wheel:</b> Built in 1930. One of the largest operational wooden overshot waterwheels anywhere at 42 feet in diameter.</p> | <p>15. <b>Normandy Buildings:</b> Built between 1931 and 1937. Originally housed students who worked at the dairy.</p> <p>16. <b>Pew Observatory:</b> Used for labs and classroom instruction.</p> <p>17. <b>Possum Trot:</b> Built in 1850 and considered the "cradle of Berry College." Martha Berry began the Possum Trot Sunday School in 1900. It was the needs of the mountain people she met here that inspired her to build her schools.</p> <p>18. <b>Gunby Equine Center:</b> 77-acre equestrian center.</p> | <p>19. <b>Freemantown Barn:</b> WinShape Centre facility.</p> <p>20. <b>Woodbury Cottage:</b> WinShape Centre facility.</p> <p>21. <b>House o' Dreams:</b> Built in 1926 by staff and students as a mountain retreat for Miss Berry.
